Synopsis:

This course introduces students to ethnographic enquiry and develops their English language skills, cultural awareness and intercultural competence through a small-scale ethnographic enquiry undertaken in the local context. This involves data collection, analysis and the reporting of results. To prepare students for the larger ethnographic project, we will explore the nature of ethnography, some of the methods used within ethnographic approaches and read a variety of samples of ethnographic works.

Objectives:

To enable students to

- a. Develop initial competence in ethnographic enquiry;
- b. Develop intercultural competence, specifically in Study Abroad context;
- c. Analyze and deconstruct the experiences, emotions and perceptions encountered when immersed in a new environment;
- d. Develop proficiency in using English within the context of an ethnographic enquiry in a predominantly English-speaking multi-cultural environment.

Content

- a. A brief introduction to ethnography;
- b. Defining ethnographic approaches;
- c. Selecting basic anthropological concepts and methods relevant to projects;
- d. Understanding and utilizing basic methods of observation and interview to elicit rich descriptions;
- e. Collecting data through field work;
- f. Understanding and employing basic methods of recording, analyzing and interpreting field data.

Opportunities for ethnographic enquiry in the university context:

- a. Identifying possible sites of interaction and associated topics

- b. Developing a proposal for a small project
- c. Conducting the project
- d. Presentation of research results

Assessment

An ethnographic project will be conducted either individually or in groups of no more than three, preferably with an individual focus for each student. There will be a variety of assessment opportunities in this course. The first will be the assignments leading up to the major project. You will submit a written plan for your final project toward the beginning of the semester. This will outline your topic and your plans for conducting the research. Once you have started to make some progress, you will be required to present your 'In-Progress' status to the group for mutual feedback. Additionally, you will do a longer final presentation toward the end of the semester. Finally, you will submit a final report summarizing your topic, methods and research. Finally, participation and attendance are essential to this process.

- a. Participation and Attendance (50 and 50pts) 10%
- b. Assignments (5X40pts) 20%
- c. Written Plan for Final Project (150pts) 15%
- d. In-Progress Oral Presentation (150pts) 15%
- e. Final Presentation at EUI conference (200pts) 20%
- f. Final Written Report (200pts) 20%
